

#### **Hello from BAWAH**



### From day one, our plans have been created with sustainability and the environment in mind

I remember the first time I saw Bawah like it was yesterday. Its lush forested hills, turquoise blue waters and white sandy beaches left such a mark on my heart. That vision is what prompted me to create a resort for guests to experience that same sense of awe and wonder, as if stepping back in time to a bygone era of unspoilt nature and beauty.

As pristine as Bawah looked from the surface, we noticed signs of destructive fishing practices, especially from dynamite fishing, even though the area had been designated a Marine Protected Area. From a very young age, I've always had a strong connection with the ocean and been passionate about protecting marine life. So when it came to developing Bawah Reserve, I was committed to making it sustainable in every way possible, starting from the way it was built to a minimal carbon footprint once it was fully operational.

I knew that to truly develop a sustainable resort, we had to go beyond protecting the environment around our islands. To ensure the area thrived as a whole, we had to pay as much attention to social responsibility towards the local Anambas community.



#### **Hello from BAWAH**

Located in the northeast of Batam, the Anambas archipelago is a haven for hundreds of coral species and sea creatures living in the North Natuna Sea. It's also home to more than 45,000 people who rely heavily on the ocean for their livelihood.

Having served in the Indonesian Navy, I have braved through the North Natuna Sea and experienced how ferocious it can be. The extreme weather poses significant logistical challenges for the people in Anambas many of who live on remote islands. Lack of connectivity is causing limited access to good quality education, electricity, telecommunication and internet connection, even basic household items which often we take for granted when living in big metropolitan cities.



During my time working for the Ministry of Maritime Affairs and Fisheries, I got very familiar with many unsustainable fishing practices that are happening across Indonesia, including in the Anambas. It broke my heart each time I came across remnants of what used to be a lush coral garden with rich marine biodiversity, and all I could see was just rubbles as the result of dynamite fishing.

Those experiences are the reasons for me to form Bawah Anambas Foundation with the support of our generous patrons. The vision of the Foundation is to protect and rehabilitate the ecosystem of the Anambas archipelago while ensuring the communities' welfare is elevated. Our vision is in line with the Anambas district government objectives, and our programmes are designed to support the government achieving their development goals.

Bawah Anambas Foundation was established in April 2018, so we have been operating for less than two years. As a young foundation, we are fully aware that there is much to learn still, and we learn a great deal each day. We are entering a new decade equipped with a better grasp of the realities on the ground, and we look forward to continuing our work in preserving the environment and serving the community better.

#### **Hello from BAWAH**

Bawah Anambas Foundation (BAF) passed the one-year mark in 2019, and what a year of learning it had been! We took a prudent approach with our program implementation on the ground to ensure we had strong foundations to build our programs on. Along the way, we learned many important lessons and saw with our own eyes how our works had helped empower the community and preserve the environment of the Anambas District.

When we started this foundation overfishing, and illegal fishing practices were common in this region, however through our marine conservation initiative by the end of 2019 we managed to protect and return the population of

normal.

It was such a proud moment when our organic farming program had inspired the community in Telaga village to develop the second farm using their budget. Not only



that, but the women in the village also came up with an idea of growing vegetables using recycled materials. The last part is extra special for us, with women having their farm it helps in reducing gender inequalities in the area and improve the economy in a family by having two sources of income.

Our Digital English Club (DEC) initiative also had a positive impact on the community that went beyond teaching English to children. It also increased children's enthusiasm for knowledge and their confidence in speaking English. As a result, these children were always so excited whenever foreign guests came over to their place as they got to practice their English skills!

Yet despite all these amazing achievements, we also had to learn the hard way of things through setbacks and obstacles that we faced while running our programs. But from these challenges, we learned and improved. In the end, we are glad that we overcame all the obstacles that came our way because now we are more equipped for the year 2020.

We will enter 2020 with much better clarity and humility in what we do. Together with the local government, communities and valuable stakeholders, we will continue our effort in protecting the environment and elevating communities' welfare of Anambas District.

### MARINE CONSERVATION

Bawah waters and its surrounding area are part of the Marine Recreational Park Anambas Islands (MRPAI), one of the largest conservation areas in Indonesia, with an area as large as 1.2 million hectares. Bawah has suffered from destructive fishing practices, including dynamite fishing or booming, and it causes damage in several areas. The Foundation focuses its Marine Conservation efforts on three main activities including Coral Restoration, Turtle Protection, and MRPAI Management Support.





### INTEGRATED WASTE MANAGEMENT






Nestled between the Malaysian Peninsula and Borneo, the Anambas Archipelago is located on the edge of Indonesia's water. Facing the wide-open seas, the Anambas provide a panoramic view of blue seas with azure lagoons. Sadly, though the Anambas is a massive waste

contributor to the oceans in Indonesia when instead, it could be a tropical paradise. To combat this problem, the Anambas Foundation has developed and implemented waste management on the islands of Bawah, Kiabu, and Telaga with the primary objective to educate the locals and staff to manage their waste responsibly and keeping the ocean clean. The programme has effectively increased awareness and changed the habits of the people who live in those three islands. The programme was a success that the district government has reached out to expand the programme into other areas.






Anambas Archipelago houses around 45,000 people, and almost 80% of the population heavily rely their livelihood on the ocean, making overfishing one of the most critical development challenges in the area. The Foundation has identified exciting new areas that can serve as a sustainable alternative livelihood for the communities in the Anambas, including Organic Farming.

Organic farming is a production system that sustains the health of the soil, ecosystems, and people. It relies on ecological processes, biodiversity, and cycles adapted to local conditions, rather than the use of inputs with adverse effects. We provide training as well as infrastructure for the community, allowing them to grow organic fruits and vegetables. Also, the Foundation guarantee 100% purchase of the harvest.







### **DIGITAL ENGLISH CLUB**



TOTAL COST USD 6,719 IDR 94 million For the past few years, many tourists, both local and foreign, have been coming to Anambas. As a result, plenty of resorts and homestays have been established thus creating more job opportunities for the locals. However, one of the main requirements to work in this industry is the ability to speak English. The local people understand how important it is to learn English and they've shown great interest in improving their skill. However, due to their remoteness, bringing an English teacher to live in such a small village would be challenging. The foundation is collaborating with CAKAP, an online language learning platform, to conduct English lessons for elementary and middle school students under the Digital English Club programme. Due to the limited seats for the online class, the Foundation also provide an offline class to accommodate the learning interest from the rest of the children.
