Message from our Patron — Tim Hartnoll

As I write this, we are entering the third year of the pandemic – with its end now in clear sight, thankfully. Early 2021 saw the start of the global rollout of COVID-19 vaccination, bringing with it the promise of eventual recovery. As vaccination rates increased day by day, the world slowly began to reopen, communities emerged from lockdowns, travel gradually started again and the global economy took its first steps toward rebuilding.

Throughout the pandemic, the Anambas Foundation has shown resilience, perseverance and admirable flexibility in its efforts towards conserving the Anambas environment and supporting its island communities. As the patron of the organisation, it's wonderful to see that, even during challenging times, the team has managed to creatively move programmes forward, expand its scope of work, and even secure international grants. These achievements will continue to serve the Foundation and our programmes, well into 2022 and beyond.

The collaborative partnership between the Foundation and Bawah Reserve remains strong. For example, I was pleased to hear that in 2021 the resort's scuba and marine team and the Foundation's marine conservation team held two joint Reef Health Monitoring (RHM) activities, one in Bawah and the other at Kiabu Village. Some of the best marine conservation news we've had recently is that more female turtles are coming ashore during the nesting season, allowing us to rescue more turtle hatchlings. Apparently, the closure of Bawah to guests has caused the islands to become quieter, and so the turtles feel safer laying their eggs here. As an Earth-first resort that is deeply sensitive to environmental issues, we take this as strong encouragement to continue to improve the way we run our pristine Bawah Reserve.

As we move into 2022 and the world steadily continues to open up, I feel hopeful that countries worldwide will soon recover and that their economies will be restored. And as international travel resumes, there's little doubt that the global hospitality industry will rebound.

I'm also looking forward to seeing what new initiatives the Foundation will undertake this year, and what new milestones it will achieve – particularly with regard to the planned expansion in our Integrated Waste Management programme and the Digital English Club project.

It remains my goal that we continue to preserve, enhance and promote the Anambas islands and their communities, so that the world will come to know more about this magnificent part of Indonesia.

Message from our Head of Advisory Board — Dr. Aji Sularso

For Indonesia, 2021 was a year filled with many ups and downs. Early in the year, the country started to deploy COVID-19 vaccines to its citizens. Frontline medical workers were first in line to get the jabs, and the rest of the population soon followed.

Indonesia faces great challenges when it comes to vaccination; this archipelagic country has remote regions that are hard to reach, including the Anambas Islands. Yet the dedication of the frontline workers made it possible for the vaccines to be administered in small villages in Anambas, where a number of the Foundation's team members received their shots back in September.

Pandemic conditions and government regulations are constantly developing here, and adjusting to these rapid changes is another thing that we have to grapple with. There have been times when our work on the ground was delayed because of travel restrictions; new programmes and activities have had to be rescheduled to next year, and important meetings with government officials postponed. Despite these difficulties, last year saw several accomplishments on our part. We presented our work in front of the Anambas Head of District, and the Anambas Head of Education paid a visit to our Digital English Club programme in Tiangau Village. The acknowledgement and support of the local government and agencies are very important to us, because all our programmes are designed to promote the development of Anambas Islands in a sustainable way.

Though 2021 was a difficult year for Indonesia, it opened up opportunities for development and growth. We are thankful to the Anambas government and agencies for their unwavering support during this time, and we hope that in 2022 we can continue to sustain and build these relationships as we expand our programme outreach within the Anambas region.

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Message from our Head of Foundation — Jerry Winata

m our communities, ith our great partnership ambas government, is ne of our endeavours.

> The good news is that we managed to survive yet another pandemic year. Despite high hopes of a return to normality last year as the vaccine was distributed throughout the country, it unfortunately didn't happen at the speed that we had initially hoped for.

2021 was a year of adjusting expectations and refocusing our work. As a non-profit organisation, one of our key challenges is that we can't work on our own. Support from our communities, together with our great partnership with the Anambas government, is the backbone of our endeavours.

Because of the pandemic, the government had to shift its primary focus to COVID-19 mitigation, and this unfortunately meant the postponement of some of the new activities and programmes we had planned for last year. Consequently, we then reevaluated our goals and strategies in line with the current circumstances. One of several key adjustments involved teaching village women how to make cloth masks from old fabric, as part of our women's empowerment programme. We also required all Digital English Club (DEC) students to wear a mask in the classroom and to wash their hands before entering.

Not only did we survive despite the setbacks, but we even managed to launch new initiatives. One of these was the waste bank in Kiabu, where the community is financially rewarded for collecting and sorting their waste. Another is KELAUT (Kelas Alam dan Laut), our Nature and Marine Class for students in Kiabu. In recognition of the resilience we showed throughout the year, we received international grants for our marine conservation programme from two organisations: Sustainable Ocean Alliance and Seastainable Co.

As we enter the new year, we have set bigger and more targets for 2022. From what we've learnt during the past two years, we now have a clearer purpose and direction for our work here in the Anambas Islands. There will be numerous challenges ahead, but I believe that with great teamwork and support from the Anambas government and communities we will not only get through this, but come out stronger.




RAMON PRASETYO. Dive Instructor - Bawah Reserve






FINANCIAL RECAP

Highlights



MARINE CONSERVATION

The Marine Conservation programme started on Bawah Island in 2018, focusing on reef health monitoring, coral transplantation, artificial reefs, turtle conservation, and education. In 2020, the team expanded this programme to Kiabu island. The main activities of marine conservation are: reef restoration and rehabilitation, reef health monitoring, mangrove conservation and marine debris clearing.





INTEGRATED WASTE MANAGEMENT


The Foundation initiated its Solid Waste Management programme in 2018. This programme, with the addition of waste upcycling, was later incorporated into our Integrated Waste Management (IWM) initiative. The main priorities of IWM are educating local communities on waste issues and how to manage waste responsibly, running the newly established Waste Bank initiative and Recycling Centre in Kiabu Village, and providing upcycling training.






ORGANIC FARMING

The Organic Farming programme in Telaga Village is managed by local residents who are members of the village's farmers' group. With support from the village government, the farm was developed on land that is owned by the village. The Anambas Foundation provides agricultural equipment and seeds, while emphasising the avoidance of chemical fertilisers and pesticides. We have also built a traditional greenhouse to protect the farm from pest attacks and have hired an expert in organic farming to facilitate the programme and teach the locals how to grow their produce organically. What's more, we also teach housewives how to grow organic vegetables at home through an initiative called Organic Home Farming. Its main goal is to provide more diverse and nutritious food sources for the community.





WOMEN'S EMPOWERMENT

We aim to empower and educate the women of the Anambas Islands by strengthening their home businesses that sell traditional snacks, teaching them organic home farming, and providing them with upcycling training to create products that have economic value. After our first upcycling training in 2021, village women in Kiabu made reusable shopping and trash bags from donated fabrics. Later in the year, we held a training in the village to show women how to grow organic fruit and vegetables at home.




DIGITAL ENGLISH CLUB

We collaborate with Cakap, an online language-learning platform, to provide English lessons for elementary and middle school students under the Digital English Club (DEC) programme. However, due to the limited places for the online class, not everyone can be admitted; so we also offer offline classes to accommodate the high demand. Moreover, as a way to educate communities from a very young age about conservation, the Foundation is combining education about environment conservation and waste management with the English lessons.

2022 GOALS

NEW YEAR, NEW RESOLUTIONS.



Expand our coral restoration efforts by 21%.

Educate more school students on marine conservation through our **KELAUT programme** by expanding it to Tarempa, the district capital of Anambas archipelago.

Continue our **marine debris data collection** and publish one research finding by the end of year.



Expand our waste management initiative to **two new villages** in Palmatak sub-district.

Build **two temporary waste storage units**, complete with the appropriate facilities such as plastic shredder, glass crusher, and thermal machine.

Educate and train 361 additional households on sustainable waste management, totaling 683 households.



Further **empower the women's group** by improving their skills to produce marketable products such as foldable reusable bags.

Expand our **Digital English Club** program to a new site and provide English lessons to **20** additional students, totaling **67 students**.

Improve our organic farming production by training more community members to grow organic vegetables at home.









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
